

Roles and Responsibilities- Diabetes Educator

Role Overview:

The Diabetes Educator provides specialized support and education to patients with Type 1, Type 2, and gestational diabetes. This role focuses on empowering patients to manage their condition effectively, improve their quality of life, and prevent complications. The educator works collaboratively with GPs, specialists, dietitians, and other healthcare professionals to deliver evidence-based care tailored to individual needs.

Key Responsibilities:

Patient Education & Support
